

## **BOATING SAFETY BRIEF CHECKLIST**

	Life jackets and throwable flotation devices  • Ensure each person has a life jacket that fits  • How to don it  • Location if stowed  • Demonstrate how inflatables work including manual activation and oral inflation  • Location and use of throwables  • Signaling devices attached, such as whistles and lights  Fire extinguishers  • Locations and use  • Pass around to guests while you explain the basics of activation and use	Basic boat operation (how to perform these safely)  • How to bring boat to a stop  • How to place engine in neutral or shut down if needed  • If sailing, how to release the mainsheet and jib to dump the sails  Man overboard  • Ensure everyone knows to throw the life ring, spare life jackets, cushions, etc., toward the person in the water  • Assign one or more people to be spotters  • Basic operation of any MOB equipment  • Discuss other MOB considerations such as preventing the MOB from being struck by the boat or propellers
	Flares & emergency signaling devices  • Types  • Where located  • Basic operation (particularly for longer cruises)	Life raft • Location and how it works • Only to be used during abandon-ship scenario
	First-aid kits & medical issues  • Point out location(s)  • Let guests know it's OK to access basic like bandages or aspirin, but to inform you of any injuries  • Ask if anyone has medical issues you should be aware of, including medications such as insulin, EpiPen, or inhalers (discuss in private if they prefer)  Safety hazards  • Point out anything that could hurt guests (slip and trip hazards, dangers of grabbing lines or rigging, hatches they can fall down  • Explain how things that move while underway (e.g., boom) can cause injury, while the boat itself can be hazardous to move about in rough seas or heavy weather  • Point out safe places to sit while sailing, docking, and/or anchoring	• Location • Brief description of what it is, how it works, how to operate it • How to remove it from the stowage bracket and turn it on if directed by in emergency  VHF radio • Location and basic operation such as how to turn it on, select channel 16, transmit, receive, and operate the red DSC feature • How to find and give the location of the vessel in the event of an emergency • Include younger crew members and also explain what it's NOT used for  Encourage questions during & after safety brief • Hold informal debrief at the end of the trip • Use feedback to fine-tune your brief
<b>M</b> •	ore good knowledge to share  Head: Location and operation, what can/can't be flushed, where to toss used tissue or other items	<b>Docking procedures</b> : Assign tasks, explain procedure when leaving or approaching dock, demonstrate proper use of fenders while docking, highlight dangers of fending off with hands or feet
	<b>Hatches</b> : How to open/close safely & when they must be kept closed, such as when someone is working on deck or while underway at night	
	<b>Safe boarding/disembarkation:</b> When docked, using the dinghy, or other anticipated situations, use of handholds, platform, etc., and avoidance of prop/rolling hull	
	<b>Trash</b> : Location and any separation requirements (remind guests not to throw anything overboard)
